Mayor and 2 Council Seats up for Election

Filing period July 1-15, 2009

Sunset City residents will be voting for a Mayor and two council members this year. The terms for Mayor Gotchy, Council Member James Bridges and Council Member Ricky Carlson are coming to a close.

The filing dates for Declaration of Candidacy are July 1 through July 15. Each person seeking to become a candidate must file in person with the City Recorder during office hours and not later than 5:00 p.m. on July 15, 2009.

A candidate for an elective position must be (1) a citizen of the United States at the time of filing, (2) a registered voter at the time of filing and (3) have resided in Sunset City for the 12 consecutive months immediately before the date of the election. Any person convicted of a felony may not hold any office in Utah until their right to hold office is restored.



From the Police Department



Solicitors - Now that summer is here, you may see solicitors in your neighborhood. It is the interest of Sunset City to protect its citizens' well being, personal safety and privacy. Your help is needed and will be greatly appreciated.

With few exceptions (such as a person representing a religious group or non-profit organization), solicitors must be registered with Sunset City before commencing solicitation.

If a solicitor comes to your door, please ask to see his or her Sunset City registration certificate. If he or she cannot provide it, please notify the Police Department by calling (801) 825-1620 during business hours or Davis County Dispatch at (801) 451-4150 after hours.

If you have a "NO SOLICITING" type sign on your door and a solicitor (registered or not) ignores your sign, please contact the Police Department.

A Message from the Fire Department

Home Safety 101



An important part of raising kids is careful supervision of their activities in the home, where they spend most of their time. Be aware of your children's surroundings at all times in order to prevent serious injuries. Every year there are more than 3 million unintentional injuries to children 14 and under than occur in the home and require care in an emergency room. This translates to 8,219 injuries per day. Each day approximately 6 children die as a result of unintentional injuries that occur in the home.

Safety on a Budget

In these tough economic times it may seem even more difficult to think about what's necessary to keep your family safe. Here's the good news: Keeping your children safe doesn't have to be expensive. There are plenty of free things you can do and low-cost safety devices that can help make your home safer. Consider the following tips to help you get started:

- Keep an eye on your children at all times. This is the best way to keep your child safe and it doesn't cost a penny.
- Keep poisonous items, such as medicines and cleaners, locked away and out of reach of children.
- Don't let children play on stairs, furniture, balconies, roofs, or in driveways, streets or parking lots.
- Practice an escape plan with your family.
- Cook on back burners and keep handles facing away from front of stove so curious children won't pull hot contents down on themselves.
- Keep bathroom doors closed with a hook-and-eye latch above a child's reach to keep kids away from hazards in the bathroom.
- Tape any loose rugs firmly to the floor/carpet to avoid slips and slides of running toddlers.

We all know that nothing replaces active supervision but the right low-cost safety devices can go a long way helping to protect children. Remember, a higher price does not mean the device is safer or easier to use.



The Sunset City Citizen Corps Council works in cooperation with the Police and Fire Departments to prepare Sunset City for Emergencies.

- We oversee the C.E.R.T program where we continue to train more citizens to help respond in an emergency. Our next C.E.R.T. training course will begin in September.
- We are currently working to get the "Sunset on Watch" program organized as well, which will help neighbors know how to better watch out for each other in their neighborhoods.

Water Quality Report for Sunset City

Water Year 2008

We are pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Water Quality Report. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. The water we drink in Sunset is purchased from the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District. A second source for water is a deep well located at 85 West 1800 North. This well is used as a backup source and is tested annually.

Sunset City has a Drinking Water Source Protection Plan that is available for review to our customers at our city offices. It provides more information such as potential sources of contamination and our source protection areas. We are pleased to report that our water is safe and meets federal and state requirements. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact the Sunset City Public Works office at 801-614-0014. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you would like to attend any of our regularly scheduled City Council meetings, they are held on every 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, 6:30 p.m., at the Sunset City offices, 200 West 1300 North, Sunset, Utah.

Sunset City routinely monitors for contaminants in our drinking water in accordance with the Federal and State laws. The following table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2008. All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these contaminants does not necessarily pose a health risk.

In the following tables you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Detected Contaminant – Any contaminant detected at or above its minimum detection limit (MDL).

Minimum Detection Limit – The lowest level at which a particular contaminant is detected with a specific degree of certainty.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) – The “Maximum Allowed” (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminate Level Goal (MCLG) – The “goal” (MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Not Applicable (NA) – there is no Federal or State MCL and or MCLG. **Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)** – nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Non-Detects (ND) – laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years, or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (ug/l) – one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) – picocuries per liter is a measure of radioactivity in water.

Sunset City purchases 100% of its water from the Weber Basin Water Conservancy District whose primary source of water comes from the Weber River Basin. The District has divided their culinary water supply into three separate distribution systems. These systems are Weber Basin NORTH, Weber Basin CENTRAL, and Weber Basin SOUTH. Weber Basin NORTH covers the area north of Ogden City. Weber Basin CENTRAL includes the area from Ogden City south to Farmington. Weber Basin SOUTH encompasses the area from Centerville to North Salt Lake. The following table represents test results of Weber Basin CENTRAL, which supplies Sunset City with culinary drinking water.

Results of cryptosporidium monitoring

Cryptosporidium and giardia are microbial pathogens found in surface water throughout the U.S. Although filtration removes cryptosporidium and giardia, the most commonly-used filtration methods cannot guarantee 100 percent removal. Monitoring conducted by the District during 2002 indicates the presence of cryptosporidium and giardia in our source water. Current test methods do not allow us to determine if the organisms are dead or if they are capable of causing disease. Ingestion of cryptosporidium may cause cryptosporidiosis, an abdominal infection. Symptoms of infection include nausea, diarrhea and abdominal cramps. Most healthy individuals can overcome the disease within a few weeks. However, immuno-compromised individuals are at greater risk of developing life-threatening illness. We encourage immuno-compromised individuals to consult their doctor regarding appropriate precautions to take to avoid infection. Cryptosporidium must be ingested to cause disease, and it may spread through means other than drinking water.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infections by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Water Drinking Hotline: 1-800-426-4791.

Results of radon monitoring

Radon is a radioactive gas that you can't see, taste or smell. It is found throughout the U.S. At this time, radon monitoring is not required by the EPA; however, the EPA is considering making radon monitoring a requirement. The proposed MCL for radon is 4,000 pCi/L for systems which have a public education program for radon. For additional information, call your state radon program or call EPA's Radon Hotline (800-SOS-RADON).


